Given we don't know each other how can you presume to know what is in our hearts and what our views of people of other color is? Yes Black Lives Matter! More than that, ALL Lives Matter!!! Even though he was a documented THUG Michael Brown's life mattered, but to hold him up as an example of racism is ludicrous! "Hands up don't shoot" never happened, according to *black* witnesses who saw what did happened.
